MESSAGE FROM OUR TREASURER: JAY NOVAK



I found this article regarding Coast Guard Documentation that some of you may find interesting.

Reasons in Favor of Coast Guard Documentation

It is your first big boat purchase. All the essentials are in place: the price is agreed upon; the survey is complete; and the financing is lined up. The only remaining issue is to determine how the vessel will be titled. Which will it be? Coast Guard Documentation or State Title? Which method is right for you and your new boat? What are the advantages of Coast Guard documentation, and why would you choose it over state titling?

There are several reasons that you may choose to document your new vessel: your lender may require documentation in order to secure its' loan with a preferred marine mortgage, the safest manner available; you may intend to use the vessel in a commercial manner that requires documentation; you may be planning on taking the vessel into international or foreign waters, where it is better protected by being documented; or maybe you just do not want those little state registration numbers on your nice, big, new boat.

In today's marketplace, vessels may cost as much, if not more than, your home. Titling and ownership issues are often much more complicated than encountered with real property. As the saying goes, "Boats float", giving rise to the opportunity of obtaining titles in more than one jurisdiction.

One of the most attractive features of Coast Guard documentation is that it is a national form of vessel registration, recognized internationally and administered by the federal government through the Coast Guard as part of Homeland Security.

The Coast Guard maintains ownership and lien information for a vessel throughout its' documented history. It records this information on an abstract of title that is readily available to the consumer public, similar to that maintained for real property. Therefore, a potential purchaser, lender, lien-holder or owner may request an abstract of title on a documented vessel and review a complete history of the vessel from its' initial documented owner to the current documented owner, any lien or claim of lien that has been filed against it, and all lien releases. Obviously, when a seller can establish an ownership and lien record for the entire documented history of a vessel, a buyer is being provided with a level of comfort that cannot be equaled by a state title. The titling records for most states are not easily accessible beyond the current owner.

For this same reason, a lender may not only prefer to loan on a vessel that can provide this abstract of title, but, depending on the size of the vessel or the size of the loan, documentation is often a requirement for the loan. Documentation is requisite in order to acquire a "preferred marine mortgage" which provides the highest level of contractual maritime lien priority.

Maritime law is based upon English common law, and it can be extremely complicated when it comes to lien priority. In some cases, the most recent loan against a vessel may take priority over any already in place. Unrecorded or hidden liens may be actionable and, again, take priority over recorded ones. Repossessed vessels may be sold with active liens, while those that have been foreclosed upon may not. Clearly, a purchaser or lender would prefer to rely upon records maintained and administered by a federal agency than any other evidence of ownership and lien status.

Secondly, because a Certificate of Documentation is an internationally recognized title document, vessels that intend on traveling in international or foreign waters hold certain rights, privileges and protections not afforded to a state titled, or non-U.S. flagged vessel. An owner of a documented vessel must be a U.S. citizen and, by extension, the vessel is protected under the same U.S. flag.

Thirdly, Coast Guard documentation may be required dependent upon the usage of the vessel. Vessels that plan to engage in commercial endeavors must be documented with the Coast Guard and qualify for the appropriate trade endorsements. The Coast Guard, as the administering agency determines whether a vessel is eligible for commercial usages. A vessel must meet not only structural conditions but titling ones as well to qualify for commercial endorsements.

Lastly, a vessel that is documented with the Coast Guard should not hold a state title, and, therefore, it does not display state registration numbers on its hull.

When applying for documentation, an official number is assigned to a vessel. Upon issuance of the Document, the vessel must be marked with its official number, its name and its hailing port. The official number must be marked on some integral part of its interior hull in numbers three inches or greater in a manner that cannot be easily obliterated or obscured. Removal of this number should never be attempted. Once an official number has been assigned, it remains forever with a vessel, and so, if a new owner chooses not to continue documentation, a subsequent purchaser can still research this official number and obtain the documented history of the vessel. Attempted removal of the official number could signal that the vessel may have been involved with a potential loss, theft or fraud that may never have been noticed with an undocumented or state titled vessel.

So, upon review, you decide to document your vessel. How do you determine if it meets the Coast Guard requirements? Essentially, any vessel that is five net tons in volume and is owned by a U.S. citizen, qualifies for documentation with a recreational endorsement. Typically this would include vessels 26 feet or greater in length. The Coast Guard has a displacement formula that is used to determine the vessel's volume.

Vessels that seek a commercial endorsement (i.e. carrying freight or passengers, commercial fishing etc.) have additional requirements. For example, one condition for commercial usage requires that the vessel and all of its component parts be manufactured and built in the United States.

So, you want to register your vessel In the highest manner possible, it is more than five net tons in volume, and you are a U.S. citizen. All lights are green for obtaining Coast Guard Documentation for recreational usage of your new vessel. What is next?

Either your broker or your lender will probably refer you to a documentation company to assist in obtaining a Certificate of Documentation in your name. As stated above, once a vessel has been

documented, it remains in the Coast Guard system. However, each time there is an ownership change, the documentation becomes void, and the new owner must re-apply for a new Certificate of Documentation.

The documentation company will research the existing documentation by requesting an abstract of title to ensure that the party selling the vessel has the right to do so and to determine whether there are any liens recorded against the vessel on the Coast Guard records. Next it will prepare all of the necessary forms to transfer ownership of the vessel to you; to payoff any existing liens; and to apply for the new Certificate of Documentation in your name. In addition, it will co-ordinate with your lender to secure its' interest in the vessel with the preferred marine mortgage previously discussed.

Once the transfer of ownership is completed, the documentation company will file the appropriate forms with the Coast Guard for processing. and the bill of sale evidencing you as the new owner and any lien will be duly recorded on the abstract of title. Upon completion of the process, a new Certificate of Documentation will be issued in your name. You are now the proud owner of a documented vessel!

LCYC INFORMATION/MEMBER INPUT SECTION:

UPCOMING SAFE BOATING COURSE: - Effective July 2016, Virginia mandated that all persons operating a motorized vessel over 10 HP to have completed a certified Safe Boating course. And they must carry their Boater Certification Card with them at all times while operating a motorized vessel in Virginia waters.

Lodge Creek Yacht Club, in conjunction with Olverson's Marina, will offer the Boat Virginia course, free of charge, on Saturday, June 2, 2018. This course is the 8-hour class and allows participants to complete the requirements necessary to receive their Boater Certification Card.

Once students have completed this course, they will be given the Boater Certification Card, and there is no legal requirement for taking any future classes to maintain boater certification.

The class will be held at the clubhouse at Olverson's Marina, and the class begins promptly at 8 a.m. Olverson's has graciously donated our lunch at no charge to students!

Become a safer boater, and join us on Saturday, June 2nd!!!

<u>VESSEL SAFETY CHECKS</u> -The most cautious boaters can sometimes experience unexpected problems on the water. That's why the U.S. Coast Guard recommends that all recreational boaters, including personal watercraft and paddle sport users take advantage of the free Vessel Safety Check program every year. We have certified Vessel Safety Check examiners here at the Marina. Contact the Marina Office and office personnel will provide you with contact information for getting this free examination. Once you have completed this free 15-minute examination, you will be given a decal that can proudly be displayed on your vessel. Taking a few minutes to have your vessel checked, just may save you from problems this season!

C-DOCKER MARGIE DAVENPORT SHARED AN ARTICLE FROM SOUNDING

Drowning Doesn't Look Like Drowning

One of the first things I ever wrote for publication was a short article about drowning recognition for a Coast Guard magazine. A few years later, I adapted the piece for recreational boaters. I tried my best

to get it published, but no one wanted it. *Reader's Digest* said it was "too dark," and everyone else (including *Soundings* magazine) simply ignored the submission.

Thanks to a friend of mine who had a blog, my piece on drowning was first posted eight years ago to the day in 2010. It went viral and crashed his website. Since then, it's been translated into 15 languages, was published in the *Washington Post*, and *Reader's Digest* eventually requested to buy the rights. After years of saying yes to requests to republish, repost and translate (there have been hundreds), I released the piece to the public domain. But I never got the article into a major boating magazine as I intended. Well, this is my blog, so I like my chances this time.

Summer is coming, folks, and I think the short article below is the most valuable thing I've put together, ever. I wanted to make sure followers of this blog have read it.

The new captain jumped from the deck, fully dressed, and sprinted through the water. A former lifeguard, he kept his eyes on his victim and headed straight for a couple who were swimming between their anchored sportfish and the beach. "I think he thinks you're drowning," the husband said to his wife. They had been splashing each other, and she had screamed, but now they were just standing neck-deep on a sandbar. "We're fine, what is he doing?" she asked, a little annoyed. "We're fine!" the husband yelled, waving him off, but his captain kept swimming hard toward him. "Move!" he barked as he sprinted between the stunned owners. Directly behind them, not 10 feet away, their nine-year-old daughter was drowning. Safely above the surface in the arms of the captain, she burst into tears and screamed, "Daddy!"

How did this captain know — from 50 feet away — what the father couldn't recognize from just 10? Drowning is not the violent, splashing call for help that most people expect. The captain was trained to recognize drowning by experts and years of experience. The father, on the other hand, learned what drowning looks like by watching television.

If you spend time on or near the water (hint: that's all of us), then you should make sure that you and your crew know what to look for when people enter the water. Until she cried a tearful, "Daddy," the owner's daughter hadn't made a sound. As a former Coast Guard rescue swimmer, I wasn't surprised at all by this story. Drowning is almost always a deceptively quiet event. The waving, splashing and yelling that dramatic conditioning (television) prepares us to look for is rarely seen in real life.

The Instinctive Drowning Response, so named by Francesco A. Pia, Ph.D., is what people do to avoid actual or perceived suffocation in the water. And it does not look like most people expect it to. When someone is drowning there is very little splashing, and no waving or yelling or calling for help of any kind. To get an idea of just how quiet and undramatic drowning can be, consider this: It is the number two causes of accidental death in children age 15 and under (just behind vehicle accidents). Of the approximately 750 children who will drown next year, about 375 of them will do so within 25 yards of a parent or other adult. In 10 percent of those drownings, the adult will actually watch them do it, having no idea it is happening.

Drowning does not look like drowning. Dr. Pia, in an article he wrote for the Coast Guard's *On Scene* magazine, described the instinctive drowning response like this:

• Except in rare circumstances, drowning people are physiologically unable to call out for help. The respiratory system was designed for breathing. Speech is a secondary or overlaid function. Breathing must be fulfilled before speech occurs.

- Drowning people's mouths alternately sink below and reappear above the surface of the water. The mouths of drowning people are not above the surface of the water long enough for them to exhale, inhale and call out for help. When the drowning people's mouths are above the surface, they exhale and inhale quickly as their mouths start to sink below the surface of the water.
- Drowning people cannot wave for help. Nature instinctively forces them to extend their arms laterally and press down on the water's surface. Pressing down on the surface of the water permits drowning people to leverage their bodies so they can lift their mouths out of the water to breathe.
- Throughout the Instinctive Drowning Response, drowning people cannot voluntarily control their arm movements. Physiologically, drowning people who are struggling on the surface of the water cannot stop drowning and perform voluntary movements such as waving for help, moving toward a rescuer or reaching out for a piece of rescue equipment.
- From beginning to end of the Instinctive Drowning Response, people's bodies remain upright in the water, with no evidence of a supporting kick. Unless rescued by a trained lifeguard, these drowning people can only struggle on the surface of the water from 20 to 60 seconds before submersion occurs. (Source: *On Scene* magazine: Fall 2006 page 14)

This doesn't mean that a person who is yelling for help and thrashing isn't in real trouble — they are experiencing aquatic distress. Not always present before the instinctive drowning response, aquatic distress doesn't last long, but unlike true drowning, these victims can still assist in their own rescue. They can grab lifelines, reach for throw rings, etc.

Look for these other signs of drowning when persons are in the water:

- Head low in the water, mouth at water level
- Head tilted back with mouth open
- Eyes glassy and empty, unable to focus
- Eyes closed
- Hair over forehead or eyes
- Not using legs
- Hyperventilating or gasping
- Trying to swim in a particular direction but not making headway
- Trying to roll over onto the back
- Appears to be climbing an invisible ladder

So, if a crewmember falls overboard and everything looks okay, don't be too sure. Sometimes the most common indication that someone is drowning is that they don't look as if they're drowning. They may just look as if they are treading water and looking up at the deck. One way to be sure? Ask them, "Are you alright?" If they can answer at all, they probably are. If they return a blank stare, you may have less than 30 seconds to get to them. And parents — children playing in the water make noise. When they get quiet, you need to get to them and find out why.
